
PAGES have always tried to bring the feeling of the community to the reader. In the past it has featured historic photographs, the photos and drawings of the old depot, or renderings of McIntosh's Victorian homes often with a horse and vintage carriage in front of them. Last year the Friends of McIntosh chose to feature one of the town's heritage live oak trees. This year photographer Don Renfroe offers us a sampling of McIntosh's architectural features.

The black and white photos on this page don't do the buildings or photographer Renfroe justice. If you want to see what they really look like, check out the tee shirts – they're in glorious color!

Not just the architectural elements, but the buildings that sport the photographed features are colorful, too. Three are yellow, two are pink, one is sage green, and one is barn red. Of the remaining two, one is stained natural wood and the other is built of native stone. While McIntosh has many architectural treasures tucked away on back streets, all but two of the featured buildings may be seen from the street in the area of the festival on avenues F and G. The other two are on Avenue H, just one block south of the festival and close to handicapped and vendor parking. Two are actually directly across a street from the park. So keep your eyes open to the magic of the town as well as the wares of the vendors.

Remember the gingerbread house from Hansel and Gretel? Could that popular folk tale have inspired the term "gingerbread" as it is applied to Victorian era architecture? Look at the fancy work in the gables of photos 1, 3, and 5 and the railing in photo 4. Can't you just imagine them worked in icing?

The Victorians loved elaborately detailed embellishment, and in the post Civil War period of affluence gin- and public buildings of the era. Even as late as the 1880's



gerbread or a style that has come to be known as "stick style" was employed in architecture. Sometimes it seems that the decoration covered every surface of both private crafted architectural embellishment.

The Friends of McIntosh, Inc., is a benevolent, non-profit organization. The Friends' primary purposes are to preserve and enhance the natural and historic beauty of McIntosh, and to promote and sponsor cultural and recreational activities while encouraging friendship, community spirit and understanding among people of all ages in McIntosh. Meetings are held at 7:00 PM on the second Tuesday of the month in the Depot, and guests are always welcome.

History of the Friends of McIntosh

The first undertaking of the Friends of McIntosh was the creation of a mini-park in 1973, now known as the McKoone-Hopwood Mini Park, next to the post office. They land-scaped the plot and built and painted a fence with materials donated from businesses in both Gainesville and Ocala.

For over thirty-five years the mini-park has offered a serene and welcoming place to relax, meet friends, and look over one's mail.


The Friends' second project was to obtain, move, and restore the McIntosh train depot which was built prior to 1890. Fundraising efforts for the depot project led to the creation of the McIntosh 1890's Festival.

The 1890's Festival

The first festival was held on Oct. 19, 1974 and was originally called the McIntosh Gay Nineties Festival. Approximately 4,000 people attended. In thirty-five years, it has grown to host over 250 vendors and an estimated 40,000 visitors annually.

Preservation and Restoration

The monies the Friends raise from the first festival purchased and moved the depot. Later festival income has continued restoration of our historic Depot and ongoing maintenance of the



Mini Park; the purchase and restoration of the J.K. Christian Warehouse; and the picket fences, Victorian style street lamps and porch addition to the Civic Center.

Continuing Projects

The Friends encourage excellence in education by regular donations to McIntosh Area School and an annual scholarship program for local scholars. See pages 10 and 16. In addition to donations to organizations such as the American Heart Association, the local Emergency Assistance Fund, the Salvation Army, the Cub, Boy, and Girl Scouts, and Hospice, the Friends maintain a food bank. For more about the Friends' food bank and community assistance, see page 16.

Light Up McIntosh

In 1993, the Friends established "Light Up McIntosh," a home and business light decorating contest held each December. Light Up brightens the gloom of mid-winter, makes the town lovely to look at, and fosters a spirit of healthy competition. (See 2011's Light Up McIntosh winners on pages 6, 7, and 8.)





THE LIVING NATIVITY has long been a tradition in McIntosh, both for the people viewing it and the participants. Each Christmas season finds the folks at McIntosh United Methodist Church preparing the "stable" in the field in front of the clinic – easily seen by travelers on US 441. Still others prepare costumes and props: organizing, making repairs, and getting them ready to travel to the site of the presentation. Then comes the actual nights of the Nativity where young and old dress in traditional costumes to perform the silent and inspiring tableau of the birth of Jesus.



Mrs. Wingate was principal of is just a memory and another school stands in its place. But students in the new school grow vegetables in almost the same location as their predecessors. This is not a coincidence. McIntosh Area School's founding principal, Shirley Lane, studied the history of McIntosh's schools and carefully combined skills from the past with educational practices of today. When she decided to have gardening as a third grade project in 2005 she asked Jack McRae to till the garden. The children were thrilled as they watched McRae create their garden with his huge tractor and harrow. Old stuff to McRae – he worked the gardens as a student in the

The McIntosh Area School students get an opportunity to eat the vegetables they planted, too. Linda Cannon McCollum, the school's first administrative assistant, remembers "we had an old gas stove brought into the kitchen in the office building to cook the kindergarteners' snacks and to later to cook vegetables from the third grade garden."

"I don't think I cooked any veggies from that first garden but subsequently when the third graders planted collard plants, I always cooked collards for them at least once or twice. I recall that only one child ever refused to

The photos on this page are of last year's third grade class. Teacher Belinda Hensley grew up in Indiana and remembers having a garden every year, so gardening was nothing new to her. She says, "The third grade garden was already part of the curriculum when I began teaching



third grade. During the transitions with new principals, I kept the garden going, because I felt the garden is important for the students. I began the flower and veggie garden in front of the third grade classroom, because the flowers would make the outside of my classroom more beautiful as well as practical. I really enjoy gardening with my students."

Last year Hensley encouraged her students to investigate gardening techniques by planting tomatoes in shopping bags. The Williston Road Publix generously donated the bags for the project and Sparr Builders Supply donated twelve large bags of potting soil. Students filled bags with soil, planted seedlings, and watched the miracle of their own garden growing. Hensley says, "We discovered that the plants in the bags produced more tomatoes and used less water than the tomatoes planted in the ground. Other benefits of utilizing a bag garden are no weeding, less fertilizer, and fewer bugs."

MICANOPY,

THE OLD TOWN OF MICANOPY IS AN HISTORIC DISTRICT, and contains a number of antique stores, interesting shops, two large used book stores and restaurants featuring home-

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cooked goodness. Micanopy (pronounced as if it were spelled mick-a-no'-pee with the accent on the third sylla-

ble) was the first distinct United States town in Florida, with settlement beginning after Spain ceded the Florida territory in 1821. When explorer and naturalist William Bartram visited in 1774, it was the site of a Seminole village called Cuscow-

illa. Bartram's favorable writings about this fertile area influenced future generations of settlers. Named after a Seminole chief, the territorial town of Micanopy was built under the auspices of the Florida Association of New York (the earliest Florida development corporation, headquartered in New York City).

Both Fort Defiance (1835–1836) and Fort Micanopy (1837–1843) were located there during the Second Seminole War. Some of the bloodiest battles of that war took place along the road southwest between the two forts.

Following World War II, many

young families who had moved away during war years did not return, and the stores became empty. Hippies discovered Micanopy and moved in for a time, to be replaced with artists. writers and craftsmen. The Center for Modern Art opened in 1961 and

canopy, which was the beginning of the antiques and collectibles center. Micanopy's

historic district was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1983. Micanopy has been used as a location for several major motion picincluding tures Cross Creek (1983) and Doc Holly wood (1991).

Many people

look forward to the large arts festival every autumn. The festival, a collaboration of the notfor-profit groups in town, brings in a crowd much larger than the town's population. People come to the Fall Festival to stroll through the streets and enjoy the town's ambiance while finding treasures to take home.





THE McIntosh Seedlings Garden





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
TOWN OF MCINTOSH BESTOWS COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD



Yearly, the McIntosh Town Council gives a Community Service Award to a special citizen at the Fourth of July celebration in the park. Council president Frank Ciotti presents the award. In his words, the award honors "someone who just takes the ball and runs with it, without any reservation or limit to the amount of hours or effort. No bluster, just a get 'er done attitude. A positive person, who helps build the community." This year the award went to John Nottingham. Nottingham is active in civic, Lions Club, and church activities, often displaying exactly the attitude that Ciotti cites. Nottingham is usually the first person

to arrive and the last to leave civic events, concentrating on those behind-the-scenes jobs that are so often tedious and thankless. He's been seen picking up supplies for the Lions Club at Sam's, running kids to get glasses for the Lions, picking up jelly jars and canning supplies for Methodist Church sales and setting up tents for the Friends of McIntosh. Interestingly, the Town Council is about a year later than the McIntosh Lions Club who chose Nottingham as their 2010 Man of the Year. The choices were for much the same reasons: Nottingham's tireless efforts toward the common good.

Eugene Colwell was known for many things. His name is synonymous with the McIntosh Fish Camp which he and wife Anne managed. There they helped people check into their cottages, buy bait, and launch their boats. He was recog-

nized as a jack-of-all-trades, seeming to be able to do anything, and willing to help those who were less competent. He was a former Marine, and an avid deer hunter, going to Georgia each hunting season. Eugene also brought his skills to the McIntosh Town Council. His business sense and perception helped guide the town. He is survived by Anne, his wife of over fifty years, two sons, four grandchildren, and one great grandchild.







10:00 - Cracker the Box. Glenn "Hamhock" Moody and Don Blitch are Cracker the Box, blues/folk singing/songwriting duo that plays original tunes with a variety of instruments, including homemade cigar box guitars. Don and Glenn have known each other and have been pickin' together for more than 20 years. Always sharing a love for traditional music, they have both been influenced by the blues, folk, bluegrass and many other styles of music. Fascinated with the cigar box guitar and the late 19th and early 20th century culture it came from, the guys have joined the ranks of a burgeoning revival of this endearing instrument.

11:00 - Willie Green, Delta style bluesman: Born in Montgomery, Alabama in the early 1930s, he worked many years with a rural share crop family. He learned the blues early in his teens when he would hitchhike or hop a freight train to town to hear the old blues masters in the juke joints. He is self-taught on both harmonica and guitar. Willie has opened shows for John Hammond, Jr., Tommy Castro, Charlie Musselwhite, Maria Maldaur, John Lee Hooker, Jr., James Cotten, Eddie Kirkland, Joey Gillmore, JJ Grey (MOFRO) and many others including an outdoor opener at Veterans Coloseum for Eric Clapton. He now resides in Ocala, and plays regularly

at the Yearling Restaurant in Cross Creek.

Noon – Cajun Dave (aka David Becnel) was Born and raised on the Westbank of New Orleans. After a US Navy hitch he studied music at Delagado College in New Orleans. He sings and plays a variety of instruments and writes and arranges songs. 
